




Donna received her Heart transplant in September 1987.



Honoring Mary Pat Crawford and “Daisy” and in special recognition of her donor. Mary Pat was diagnosed in the late 1970s with systemic lupus after many years of baffling illness. The lupus eventually destroyed her kidneys. She had her first kidney transplant in 1987 at OHSU, which her body rejected within a few days after surgery. She eventually went on dialysis but remained on the donor waiting list. On April 12, 1989, she had a second kidney transplant, again at OHSU, which was very successful. She has always referred to this kidney as “Daisy” and the family has celebrated Daisy’s “birthday every year at our favorite restaurant where the pianist immediately plays the song “Daisy, Daisy” when Mary Pat enters the dining room. Mary Pat has been very active in Oregon Donor Program and served on its Board of Directors for several years. She has been employed at the Milwaukie Providence Hospital as one of their social service managers for 13 years, and she has also worked evenings as a children’s counselor in Vancouver. She has two daughters and one grandson living in the Portland area and they all have a very close, wonderful relationship. Mary Pat is a happy, reasonably healthy, and very inspirational daughter and friend. We are truly blessed.



Michael Joseph Devery became an organ donor in Portland, Oregon on December 26, 1999 after suffering fatal injuries in a single vehicle accident on his motorcycle on December 23, 1999. He was born in the Bronx, New York in 1958 but spent his early years in southern California. Michael, age 41, left a wife, a son, two daughters, two step-daughters and one step-son. His donation was his heart - the very best part of him. A quick wit and easy sense of humor served him well and he had a special rapport with the elderly. He adopted one elderly resident in his wife's foster care home as the grandpa he never had as a child. This grandpa, Russ, died exactly two weeks after Mike's death. They were very close. Twenty years ago to the day Michael died, he received an accidental gunshot wound that caused the loss of one kidney and injuries that should have taken his life. We are thankful he was given those extra twenty years for the joy he brought into our lives. We miss him! The red hearts represent the heart he donated. The roses represent the many roses that he and his wife, Lynda, shared throughout their nine years of marriage, their favorite flower.

The square is made up of a cream-colored diamond in the center of a navy blue with a star background. In the middle of the diamond sits a puffy red heart, trimmed with a black zigzag wearing a cowboy hat. The heart bears the name of the heart transplant recipient, Lew. A large yellow star shines down on the heart and hat. The heart represents the precious gift of the donor, the black zigzag represents the stitches of a new life for Lew which is represented by the cowboy hat. The yellow star represents Lew's wife shining down on him from heaven along with many other stars. TTEOT is their secret message. TTEOT means Till the End of Time and was a very popular song when Lew and his wife were courting. Lew is a very special individual. He's a very caring and loving Dad and Grandpa. He touches so many lives. God has blessed him with new life. He'll have plenty more years to listen to country-western music and to wear his cowboy hat!
