People who are not officially registered can follow a link to Donate Life America's

National Registration Page, where they can register on their state's donor registry.

With over 161 million members in the United States, Facebook has the potential to bring major exposure to the need for organ, eye and tissue donors, which is good news for the over 114,000 men, women and children waiting for a lifesaving transplant.

To share your organ donor status on Facebook, go to your Timeline, click on "Life Event" in the "Status" field, select "Health and Wellness," and choose "Organ Donor." If you need to officially register in your state, click on the "Officially Register" link.

# Student Spotlight: Madison High School

In November 2011, a small group of the Madison High School students attended Donate Life Northwest's Lifesavers Breakfast. They were inspired to educate their classmates about the importance of registering to be a donor and motivated by the story of their classmate Alondra Soregue, whose mother Maria Guadalupe is waiting for a kidney. Under the guidance of their Health Occupations teacher Gillian Davis and Education Outreach Program Coordinator Valerie Egan, the students began planning a project on an impressive scale: a donor registration drive, school-wide assembly and an evening concert, supported by the award-winning music department at Madison.

Fast forward to April 6<sup>th</sup>, 2012! The kids were both nervous and excited as the auditorium filled up with over 800 students and teachers. An hour-long assembly featured music, video, and Donate Life Northwest speakers including volunteer (and Madison alumni) Blake Adams. Sophomore Alondra bravely took the stage and talked about the impact her mother's illness and wait has had on her family and life.

The evening assembly attracted an equally impressive crowd - nearly 125 community members listened to the stories of living kidney donor Staci Fisher and kidney recipient Kara Mortimer. Erin Grabowsky of Community Tissue Services illuminated the science of donation for the audience.

After the assembly 30 students signed up on the donor registry. A separate student organized fundraiser for the Soreque family, raised \$700. Moreover, this amazing group of students - many planning on future careers in healthcare - gained a great sense of accomplishment as well as an opportunity to blossom as student leaders, organizing a major, multi-lingual event dedicated to donation and transplantation. It was truly a unique event and Donate Life Northwest is both proud and grateful for having supported this very special student project.

How does Donate Life Northwest spread the word about donation? This year, Education Outreach has focused its efforts on teacher outreach in an attempt to identify and form relationships with health, science and driver's education teachers throughout Oregon and SW Washington. Although donation education is not mandatory within the Oregon state curriculum, many teachers actively support donation awareness in the classroom. By including it in their lesson planning, they can potentially reach up to 150 students!

Donate Life Northwest provides educators - whether middle, high, public, private or alternative - with free "Teacher Kits" highlighting

our teen-friendly DVD Your Decision to Donate. This 11 minute video covers the basics - why and how to register. It's been a hit with many teachers and volunteers, who often use the video to introduce their presentations to high school students. Teachers also receive tools to complement the lesson - a donor registration form and homework assignments which encourage students to discuss their decision with their families. They also receive information about our Student Projects, In Class Presentation program, and Discover OHSU! field trip. Since November, 184 teachers have received these kits - nearly half in rural eastern and southern Oregon.




## New Look, Features for UNOS Patient Website
